SNAKE SEASON

It's Snake season again! For the next 4-6 weeks we will start seeing snakes out in the open, in our yards, along the lake and along the clubhouse creek. Why is this happening? The snakes are waking up from winter hibernation, entering into mating season, looking for food and are looking for warm spots to sun. As reptiles they do not have the ability to control their internal temperature so they like to lay on warm rocks or concrete. After about 4-6 weeks, the ambient temperature will begin staying at or above 70 degrees and they will no longer need to sit out in the open to warm themselves.

The majority of the snakes that we will encounter will be non-venomous banded water snakes. The most common and infrequent venomous snakes in BV are: 1) the slender, colorful banded coral snake (they like leaf liter), 2) the tan and brown copperhead (they also like leaf liter), and 3) the dark, chubby water moccasin (will be in areas close to water). Water snakes can look similar to the water moccasin, but a water snake will have a long, tapered tail and vertical stripes on its lower mouth; whereas, a water moccasin has a short stubby tail and no vertical stripes on its mouth. Looking at the shape of the head is the least reliable way to determine if a snake is venomous.

If snakes are in your yard, they are seeking food and/or warmth. They don't just wander around. They use heat sensors in the nasal area to identify food sources, such as mice, rats, baby bunnies, baby opossums, frogs and even birds from time to time. They will also seek out warm spots, such as concrete or porches.

The best way to keep snakes out of your yard is to remove all food sources or things that attract food sources, such as bird seed and dog poop. Spraying your yard or porch with a nontoxic snake repellent (available at Home Depot) can help because some snakes have a very sensitive sense of smell. The best way to get a snake to leave your yard is to spray it with your water hose. Remember you can put yourself at risk of being bitten if you reach in to kill the snake because you are putting yourself within striking range.

This photo shows a good comparison of the heads of a water snake VS a water moccasin (aka cottonmouth).

MORE BASEBALL TRIVIA 2



What is something that almost nobody knows about baseball??

There are two rules that are never enforced that are still in the rule book that I find humorous and interest.

Rule 3.09 states that players may not fraternize with a member of the opposing team at any time while in uniform. HAHA, Of course we see ball players talking to each other all the time, In between pitches, standing on a base together, and in between outs. Could you imagine how quiet it would be if they obeyed this rule!? There is also no penalty in the rule book if you are caught 'fraternizing' with a player on the opposing team.

Another interesting rule that is never enforced is Rule 8.Something. It states that if there are no outs, a pitcher has 12 seconds to pitch the ball once he receives it back from the catcher or the umpire can call a ball. Given the last few years MLB is trying to come up with ways to speed up the game and speed up pitchers, the 'rule 8' has been there all along. It may need a little tweaking but, why reinvent the wheel!?

How fast did the pitchers throw during Babe Ruth's era?

There were no radar guns in the days of Babe Ruth. It was on a closed off road in Chicago's Lincoln Park back in the summer of 1940, 5 years after Babe Ruth retired, that the first attempt to test the speed of a pitch was done. Obviously, if it was done on a closed off road in a city park then Bob Feller (The Pitcher) was neither standing on a mound or playing in an official game. With no radar gun, they compared "Rapid Robert's" pitch with a speeding motorcycle. Standing there with a baseball in his right hand, waiting and then momentarily flinching as the Harley Davidson motorcycle with a city policeman roared closer to him.

The Harley motorcycle had a 10-foot head start on Feller's fastball and was doing 86 miles per hour when it flew by, just a few feet to the right of the Indians' ace. At that moment in U.S. history, Feller was just about the most famous ballplayer, certainly the most famous pitcher in the land. Soon after he began pitching for Cleveland, at the age of 18, he was on the cover of *TIME* magazine. Six seasons later, on this summer day in Chicago, Feller was the top fireballer in the game.

"I suppose I wanted to know as badly as everybody else how hard I could throw a baseball," Feller told me decades later. "Since I'd been a little guy, I'd heard people talking about how I was the next Lefty Grove or Walter Johnson."

Seconds after the motorcycle flew past, Feller flung the regulation-size hardball in his right hand. Feller's offering quickly outraced man and machine, ahead by a good three feet when it split the paper bull's-eye target that was held upright by a wooden frame.

"To this day I still don't know how I hit that target on the first try," Feller said. "It was the luckiest thing I've ever done."

A split-second after Feller's offering broke the paper target, the motorcycle obliterated its target. Enough variables were satisfied to calculate the speed of the pitch. Soon afterward, MLB announced that Feller's fastball had been clocked at 104 miles per hour.

It was not until the 1960's that radar guns that the police had used to identify speeding vehicles, were first used to identify the speed of a pitched ball, but the accuracy of the radar guns are hard to prove. Most scouts do not trust the radar guns built into stadiums that post the speed of every single pitch automatically. A good scout will bring his own radar gum, of which the most common type used is called the JUGS gun.


